SPRINGBOARD PROFILE



Springboard has been a changemaker for almost 30 years. Since 1992, at a time of structural unemployment and during the awful last 'death throes' of the Troubles, Springboard has operated in an everchanging situation, through ceasefires, political agreements, boom times, recession, Direct Rule, devolution and now Brexit and Covid–19, reaching over 12,500 people through its programmes.

This Impact Report is a snapshot of Springboard's operation in 2019/20, a year in which Springboard ran amazing programmes, serving 492 participants but which ended in March 2020 with the first impact and lockdown of the pandemic.



The scale and breadth of Springboard's 2019/20 programmes is striking but more important than 'what' Springboard does is 'how' it does it. Springboard's work, mainly, but not exclusively with young people, has always had a holistic approach to the development of the individuals on its programmes, and the need to collectively contribute to a better society that values diversity. These values are reflected in the comments of participants about their experience across the 2019/20 programmes. They highlight the growth of self-esteem, work ethic, teamwork, community service and independence and being stretched beyond their comfort zones.

This has had remarkable impacts on individual development, employability, mutual understanding and greater cultural competence, with corresponding community benefit. These outcomes are also reflected in the remarkable statistics of the programmes presented in this Impact Report. In the final 2 weeks of March 2020 our society faced the biggest challenge of generations with the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic and the first lockdown. Springboard immediately began to creatively adapt delivery of its programmes but ever holding to the integrity of its personcentred approach and drawing on its wealth of experience as it moves towards its' fourth decade of change-making.







Is a partnership between Springboard, Roe Valley **Residents Association, Cavan & Monaghan Education &** Training Board. The programme (2017-2021) will work with 1016 young people through seven programme interventions per year.

The cross-community/cross-border initiative will support distinct groups of disadvantaged & at-risk young people to realise their potential & become active contributors in building a shared, united and more cohesive society. Together young people will build individual capacity, develop an appreciation of diversity & active citizenship. The programme is supported by the European Union's PEACE IV programme, N Ireland Executive, The Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth and managed by the Special EU Programmes Body (SEUPB).

JobWorks+ aims to increase employability and social inclusion, through provision of activities over a four-year period (2018-2022), for 520 young people aged 16-24 years who are not in education, employment or training and are from disadvantaged communities in Belfast.

This is a rolling programme and provides participants with an opportunity to co-design their development pathway based on individual needs. The programme is part funded through the Northern Ireland European Social Fund Programme 2014-2020, Dept for the Economy, Belfast City Council, NI Executive Office Urban Villages and Keltbray.



FUSION - Impact Dashboard by end of 2019/2020



A cross-community, cross-border programme that worked with marginalised communities from both PUL and CNR backgrounds, many of whom felt excluded from politics and public representation, as well as community and civic life.

Whilst initially focused on bands, the participation also broadened to include youth groups, culltural groups and others. All areas were impacted not only by high levels of social and economic deprivation but also by ongoing perceived challenges to reconciliation. The programme external evaluator highlighted the significant impact of the programme, reflecting the 'group represented the most impressive cross-community relationship he had experienced in a long career. The interaction went far beyond the polite conversation and planned joint activities of many reconciliation projects. There was real togetherness, provocative banter, mocking jokes, protective concern and a tangible sense unity. The friendship was palpable.'



Catalyst 7

Catalyst was a 24-month youth-led cross-community programme. The programme focused on areas within Belfast which suffer high levels of social and economic deprivation and worked with 38 young people aged 16-25 years in themes of personal and social education, citizenship, employability and mutual understanding.

The programme objectives were to promote greater understanding and acceptance of diversity within and between communities thereby reducing sectarianism and promoting economic prosperity by increasing the skills base and future employment options of 'at risk' young people.

Programme highlights included completion of a social action project with Laurelhill House where they worked alongside families, residents and staff of the care home to develop a sensory garden, benefiting the residents who were affected by dementia. The garden was launched in 2019 and was a great success. Catalyst was funded by the International Fund for Ireland's Personal Youth Development programme and managed by Rural Action.

FUSION+ (THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE) - Impact Dashboard by end of 2019/2020



Fusion+, worked with 14-17 year olds from four schools in Belfast Malone Integrated College (South Belfast), Edmond Rice College (North Belfast), Colaiste Feirste (West Belfast), Dundonald High School (East Belfast) and two schools from Limavady, Limavady High School and St Marys Limavady.

The project used an arts-based approach to bring young people together from schools located in across areas of social and economic disadvantage and who are impacted by the legacy of the conflict. Participants attended good relations workshops and together designed and delivered a socially oriented performance 'True 2 You – Unlocked & Powerful'.

The performances, held in Limavady and Belfast before a combined audience of 250 people, explored the open and closed doorways that exist within young peoples' lives in their communities. Performances were followed by an interactive workshop where the audience engaged with the themes presented by the young people. The cross-community project was led by former participants who were employed as mentors and worked with Springboard staff, to share the transformative impacts of their good relations journey. As well as co-delivering sessions, the mentors increased skills and abilities and achieved accreditation. The programme was funded by NI Executive Office, Central Good Relations Funding.

CHALLENGING PREJUDICE - Civic and Community Leadership Development - Impact Dashboard by end of 2019/2020

"This project has allowed me to gain a greater understanding of the Holocaust and the impact then and for future generations. It has given me the opportunity to meet an amazing group of people who I would never have crossed paths with and... their experience and knowledge has widened my thinking on certain topics and given me a different outlook and perspective on life."

The 3-year programme raises awareness of the trigger issues that result in intimidation and hate crime within Derry City and Strabane Council area, by introducing participants to the history of the Holocaust through facilitated seminars and learning workshops and a study visit to the former Nazi concentration camp Auschwitz-Birkenau in Poland.

The programme is funded by Derry City & Strabane District Council.

14-NOW

During 2019-2020 Springboard continue to lead the 14-NOW programme which enables community partners in Monkstown, Limavady and Creggan to work with residents who design and lead on local activities in response to local needs. Since its inception the programme has reached 70,000+ individuals through, for example, events and directly supported 3400+ beneficiaries across the outcome areas. The external evaluator report highlighted the programme had led to an increase in personal wellbeing across all projects.

The external evaluator highlighted the programme had led to an increase in personal wellbeing across all projects. Findings showed an average increase of 24.5% for life satisfaction, 24.8% for participants identifying their life was worthwhile, 26.2% for overall happiness and a decrease of 23.8% for anxiety. The evaluation also revealed positive results on social connectedness, where there was an increase of 48.44% in participants feeling engaged or very engaged in their community. The programme is funded by Spirit of 2012.
